



10. José March Industrial Chimney

An isolated chimney belonging to the José March industrial facilities used to bottle El Salmón vinegar, known for its unique, fish-shaped glass bottles. It was located in the local industrial area that survived in the neighbourhood until the 1960s. Only part of the factory's brick façade wall and the chimney, also made of brick, remain.

All late 19th-early 20th century factories had chimneys as they provided steam to power the machinery.

The factory is made of fired brick, a material used in these buildings for its good thermal performance. It comprises an octagonal base standing 3 metres high with an entrance through an arch, an octagonal shaft with straight edges formed by special pieces, and a crown or capital topping off the shaft. The transition between the shaft and the capital consists of three rows of brick.

The inverted truncated pyramid at the top is divided into sections formed by reinforcing the edges of the octagon with protruding bricks.

The chimney is classified as an Asset of Local Relevance (Monument of Local Interest).
